rubble of the Stony Platform, through which the trough is presumed to have been cut. The vertical bedrock edge on the North West side might be a joint-side.

Two further sections to the North East indicated that the belt of yellow stones had no depth, and that the section drawn above simply happened to coincide with a joint.

PHASINS

There was no size difference between the yellow stones and those of the stony platform (1183), the yellow line crossed the North East limit of 1183 and was therefore later than it.
