~~6815~~ ~~causing~~ Wall of house? These slabs were visible early on and were ~~in~~ deemed to be of a late structure. The slabs had black soil between them. They bounded an area which contained burnt stores ⁽⁶⁸²³⁾ and was initially thought to contain an occupation level i.e. one was anticipated for PHASING underneath 6827. None materialised, but an area of outside wear did (6853). This latter, plus the hearth 6823, plus the wall-like appearance of 6811 / ~~6815~~ / 685

argue for a rectangular structure.

Against this interpretation is the remarkable coinciding of the walls 6811/6815 with the bedrock causeway of 6869: i.e. the causewayed top to 6869 was formed by the quarrying out of the ditch segments, the resultant ridge surrounding the ditch accords precisely with the positions of the "walls" 6811/6815.

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
